
at any time.

Sunday, February 20, students gathered at Spencerville Adventist Academy to compete in the First Lego Adventist Robotics League competition. The one-day event included closed judging for their innovation research project and the robot challenge in which they competed with schools from Maryland and surrounding states.

The two South Lancaster Academy CPUsaders robotics club teams arrived early morning and began preparing for their first in-person competition.. They set up to practice and waited their turn with the judges and competition tables. Our teams were up first for the

project judging. The teams anxiously gathered outside the rooms awaiting their turn.



One team researched how produce is transported from farm to store and the other on how disaster relief agencies transport life-saving materials to areas that have been hit with a disaster. The goal of the projects was to present a problem and propose a solution to solve the transportation issues these two industries face.

The two teams came out of the judging excited and confident in their presentation. During the

thirty minute judging period students presented their projects and had a 20 minute Q&A session regarding their projects, the team's core values, and their robot design. The kids confidently answered each of the judge's questions.

The final event was a team robot competition against the other participating teams. Each team had 2.5 minutes to complete as many missions as possible. Our teams received honors in multiple categories. Team 1 received first runner up in the core values and

third runner up in the innovation project. Team 2 placed first in the innovation project and first

runner-up for robot design. Team 2 also received first place runner-up in the champion category resulting in an invitation to nationals which will take place in Orlando, Florida, May 2022. They will be working hard in the coming weeks to improve their skills and prepare to face the best teams in the country. ~Mrs. Iria
